


A Fashionable Nimzo-Indian Line

1. d4 $\mathbb{Q}f6$
2. c4 e6
3. $\mathbb{Q}c3$ $\mathbb{Q}b4$

An opening line that has been attracting more and more attention recently is without a doubt the Fianchetto Variation of the Nimzo-Indian (in our keycode qualified as a Symmetrical English under the move order 1.c4 c5 2. $\mathbb{Q}f3$ $\mathbb{Q}f6$ 3.d4 cd4 4. $\mathbb{Q}d4$ e6 5. $\mathbb{Q}c3$ $\mathbb{Q}b4$ 6.g3 $\mathbb{Q}e4$). There is no doubt that, thanks to the active $\mathbb{Q}g2$, White has a lot of dynamic options, which should be good compensation for his ruined pawn structure. Instead of the standard 7. $\mathbb{Q}d3$, we are going to examine the new approach starting with 7. $\mathbb{Q}c2$, which has gained popularity in the last few years. The question is: what is the difference between the two moves? The line 7. $\mathbb{Q}c2$ requires accurate play

and avoids, for instance, the line 7. $\mathbb{Q}d3$ $\mathbb{Q}c3$ 8.bc3 $\mathbb{Q}c5$, in which Black gains an important tempo. Also, in some lines the white rook gets to d1 quickly, exerting pressure along the d-file. Moreover, White does not withdraw his knight like he does in the line 7. $\mathbb{Q}d3$ $\mathbb{Q}a5$ 8. $\mathbb{Q}b3$, which means that the knight on d4 will offer him other dynamic options for getting the initiative.

The line is still developing and I think that, until we see new practical games, the one I played versus Athanasios Mastrovasilis might present an instructive strategic plan for Black. So let's examine the options.

A Solid Hedgehog Set-up

As mentioned, the strategy followed in the game Mastrovasilis-Antic, with its solid Hedgehog set-up, looks like the best. Even here, Black should be careful with the move order, he should not, for example, rush with castling until he has completed a proper defensive set-up.

After 7. $\mathbb{Q}c2$ $\mathbb{Q}c3$ 8.bc3 $\mathbb{Q}e7$ we have some similarity with the 7. $\mathbb{Q}d3$ line, as played in several games by top grandmaster Karjakin. But there is a difference as well: White can quickly develop an initiative, as we can see in the game Radjabov-Gashimov, and also in Shimanov-Durarbeyli, where White quickly obtained pressure



along the d-file. It is also very much worth mentioning that in my opinion the right spot for the Black's knight is d7! This kind of flexibility gives Black the possibility to exploit positional weaknesses in his opponent's camp later on.

The Exposed Queen on a5

The statistics of the games played in this line definitely favour White. It seems to me that 7. $\mathbb{Q}c2$ is a good preparation against 7... $\mathbb{Q}a5$. Using a few tempi to chase Black's queen, White grabs the initiative, even in games, e.g. David-Battaglini, in which Black was close to equality. I have to say that I am not so satisfied with the active options Black has here. Simply put, there is not enough counterplay, and the best Black

can do is draw with some effort. Also, if we compare 7... $\mathbb{W}c2$ $\mathbb{W}a5$ to 7... $\mathbb{W}d3$ $\mathbb{W}a5$, we can see in our aforementioned line after 8. $\mathbb{B}g2$ $\mathbb{B}c3$, White has the strong 9.0-0, a good temporary piece sacrifice.

the attempt to save the piece with 9... $\mathbb{B}a4$ can give White a strong initiative, as witness the game Matlakov-Diu. There is the additional plus that $\mathbb{W}c2$ directly attacks the knight on a4!


The Remaining Option

Besides the main options 7... $\mathbb{B}c3$ and 7... $\mathbb{W}a5$, there is another one: 7...f5, as seen in the game Stoczek-Arnold. In all the databases I have at my disposal, I have found only two games with this move. And let's not forget that there are no further options. What to say about 7...f5? Simply that in such dynamic positions there is no time for experiments.

Conclusion

In modern chess it is very difficult to give a final conclusion about any position. The present line is pretty new and still developing. I feel that, with the suggestion I have recommended, Black has good counterplay, and I advise you to try playing this system. Real, practical games are very important for the development of every variation, and of course for this one as well. In the meantime, the ball is in White's court and we will wait for his answer, especially at top level. I hope you will enjoy the material presented here.
